

MENTAL HEALTH



The goal of our Walking Together Program is to increase awarness of and activate support for people with perinatal depression. During the year 2023, 8 modules composed of workshops and support groups were held, benefiting 58 participants from across the state of Washington. This effort has been possible thanks to the collaboration of the Perigee Foundation.

In 2023, we continued with our effort to reduce solid waste among migrants and people working on landscaping by training 100 participants and conducting an intensive communicative campaign on proper handling and risks associated with pesticide management in Washington State.

Throughout the year, we engaged in a series of panels, interviews, and social media event discussions led by Dr. Ileana Ponce, CHW with migrants, growers, and experts in the field of pesticide management and environmental protection against hazards.

This endeavor has been an exciting journey, focusing on providing quality food and dedicating time to serve the community as endorsed by the coalition.




YOUTH ENVIRONMENTAL AMBASSADOR

Community Health Worker and Front and Centered collaborated to engage Latinx youth in Environmental Justice.

The participants learn about project management, leadership, and communication skills. Our three ambassadors, Jesse, Rosita & Adrian, had the opportunity to facilitate the presentations they created and shared

resources in their communities to foster dialogue and reflection on topics regarding pollution, restoration, connections between culture and nature, food sovereignty, transportation, energy, and more.






WIC AMBASSADORS SNOHOMISH

THE WIC PROGRAM (WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN NUTRITION PROGRAM) OFFERS HEALTHY FOOD AND OTHER BENEFITS TO FAMILIES, ESPECIALLY PREGNANT WOMEN, NURSING MOTHERS, NEWBORNS AND CHILDREN UNDER FIVE YEARS OF AGE. IN 2017, WIC REACHED ABOUT 275,000 PEOPLE IN WASHINGTON, INCLUDING NEARLY HALF OF THE BABIES IN THE STATE. HOWEVER, THE DISPARITY IIN THE POPULATION WE SERVE PERSIST BECAUSE 33% OF LATINX BABIES AND MOTHERS WHO QUALIFY FOR WIC STILL DO NOT HAVE ACCESS.

STOP RACISM FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE



Community Health Worker Coalition for Migrants and Refugees is working with youth to reduce discrimination among Latinx in Snohomish.

Social injustice and racism are two words hard to hear, although we are an important part of Washington State, we have experienced discrimination, and racism based on our accent, color skin, culture, sexual orientation, and only because we are Latinx. Our children and youth are emotionally treated and stereotyped as dummies. Unfortunately, there is a structural barrier faced by people who are victims of racism and discrimination, and most of the time these attacks go unnoticed. Therefore, CHWCMR and the Snohomish County Executive Office are working together to create meaningful changes and combat racism in our county. Our Program, Youth Ambassador for Social Justice, developed a communication campaign to educate our youth about what to do if they are victims of racial attacks, here is the narrative of Mrs. Margarita, a Latinx community leader who shared her own experience with her son within the School System in Snohomish.

ORAL HEALTH

In 2023 oral health workshops were conducted to reduce health disparities. An oral health fair to receive free cleaning was offered to the community along with training ambassadors to help educate people on oral health and the benefits.





A 5-month program was created to assist participants in their groups to improve their health benefits by increasing water consumption. By being a part of this program, participants received resources and information to achieve the goal of improving their health habits.






FISCAL YEAR REPORT2022-2023
