


As you read our **2025 Annual Report**, I invite you to reflect with us on a year shaped by resilience, growth, and an unwavering commitment to the communities we serve. We expanded our reach, strengthened our programs, and deepened partnerships across WA. With more than 50 CHWs, we delivered life-changing support from health, oral, and environmental education to perinatal mental health accompaniment, LGBTQ+ advocacy, and emergency response for families facing smoke, trauma, discrimination, and economic hardship. This year brought extraordinary victories: 29 programs implemented; thousands of families supported with fans and filters, toys, backpacks, and economic stipends; and expanded training that elevated the skills and leadership of CHWs statewide.

Oral Health 2025

January 2025 - December 2025

The Oral Health Ambassadors program was created to increase awareness, knowledge, and access to preventive oral health care in our communities. It focused on addressing common oral health concerns, reducing barriers to dental care, and providing culturally appropriate education, particularly for Spanish-speaking families and individuals who often face challenges accessing dental services.

Implemented over several months, the program included educational workshops and facilitated discussions led by trained staff and Community Health Workers (CHWs). Through this approach, participants received practical tools, culturally relevant information, and ongoing support to improve their oral health and overall, well-being.

Pesticide Education Campaign

CHWCMR successfully implemented a statewide, community-led educational and outreach initiative to reduce human and environmental exposure to pesticides among Meso-American immigrant and refugee communities in Washington State. Grounded in environmental justice, the project focused on pesticide safety and hazardous waste management in both horticultural and household settings.

This initiative trained 60 Community Health Workers (CHWs) to deliver culturally responsive, multilingual pesticide safety education. CHWs conducted 30 workshops across six counties, directly reaching 300 participants. Through intentional peer-to-peer education, participants shared information with others, extending the project's reach to an estimated 3,000 additional community members.

A complementary media and educational outreach campaign significantly amplified the project's reach through television and radio PSAs, monthly social media content, multilingual print materials, and in-person community events. Together, these efforts exceeded expectations, engaging more than 47,500 individuals online and over 5,000 people through media and community-based activities.

Outcomes



Project outcomes surpassed key targets. A total of 353 participants demonstrated increased knowledge of pesticide safety (176% of the goal), 2,820 partners and community members engaged through outreach activities (94% of the goal), and overall digital engagement reached 95% of projected outcomes. Collectively, these achievements strengthened community capacity, increased awareness of pesticide risks, and advanced public health equity through trusted, community-driven education.

The Migrant and Refugee Community Health Workers Coalition, with support from the Washington State Department of Ecology, developed a program to support migrants and refugees working in agriculture across the state. The program provides education on the safe and proper use of pesticides and raises awareness about the health and environmental consequences of inadequate information or unsafe practices.



Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)


The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) is a federally funded nutrition program administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service. WIC supports pregnant and postpartum individuals, infants, and young children by improving access to healthy foods, offering nutrition education and breastfeeding support, and connecting families to healthcare and community resources.

WIC services experienced a temporary and challenging pause in funding during the October–November government shutdown. Although there was understandable anxiety about the program's future, we stayed closely connected with WIC staff and continued supporting families throughout this period.

Our CHWs participated in multiple outreach events, distributing WIC information and helping families in need access available services. We remain committed to strengthening this partnership and look forward to continuing our journey toward becoming a WIC-certifying agency in 2026.

A Year of Community-Led Impact

In 2025, CHWCMR launched a community-driven air quality initiative in the Moxee Valley, rooted in environmental justice and resident leadership. Guided by a diverse Community Advisory Board (CAB), the project centered the voices of those most affected by air pollution, including families living near busy roadways, orchards, agricultural worksites, schools, and small businesses. By elevating lived experience and pairing it with practical, community-led solutions, the initiative empowered residents to learn, lead, and advocate for cleaner air and healthier neighborhoods.

Community Engagement & Participation

From March through May 2025, CHWCMR—under the leadership of Dr. Ileana Ponce-González—convened three bilingual community workshops and a community-wide summit, creating trusted spaces for dialogue, learning, and collaborative planning. These gatherings brought residents, CHWs, and partners together to identify priorities, share lived experiences, and co-design solutions for a healthier Moxee Valley.

Community-Driven Action Strategies

Through collective discussion and planning, residents identified tangible solutions with long-term benefits for health, the environment, and economic stability, including:

- Expanding tree planting and green infrastructure to naturally filter air pollutants
- Reducing open waste burning through education, composting, and improved recycling access
- Advocating for a public transportation route to Moxee to reduce vehicle emissions
- Promoting safer pesticide practices and improved communication between growers and nearby residents
- Supporting annual hazardous waste collection events
- Encouraging renewable energy adoption and reducing reliance on diesel

Grassroots Leadership & Collective Voice

The Community Advisory Board comprised of a pastor, truck driver, orchard manager, firefighter, pesticide applicator, high school advisor, and local cook ensured the project remained grounded in lived experience and cultural relevance. Their leadership strengthened outreach, informed bilingual materials and curriculum revisions, and built trust across the Valley.

A robust communication campaign reached thousands through local radio, multilingual social media, door-to-door outreach, and community storytelling, transforming air quality from an abstract issue into a shared community mission.

Despite challenges, including resistance from some agricultural supervisors, farmworkers bravely raised concerns about wildfire smoke exposure and unsafe conditions—reinforcing the urgent need for continued environmental justice efforts in Moxee Valley and beyond.

This project demonstrates the power of community-led solutions and affirms that clean air is both a fundamental right and a shared responsibility.






Friends for Life

April 2025 - June 2025

Friends for Life is a campaign focused on harm reduction messaging that does not stigmatize non-prescription opioid use, empowers people to take action to prevent or reverse opioid overdoses, and frames these actions as signs of caring for their loved ones. Through Friends for Life community members were encouraged to learn more about the importance of Naloxone use and the ways in which productive conversations can be had about the use of opioids such as fentanyl.




The Thriving Communities program aims to raise awareness and understanding about the harmful impacts of toxic air pollution from wildfires and from agricultural pesticides and herbicides and to provide our community with the knowledge and the tools needed to help mitigate the problem of exposure to toxic air.

Specific program objectives are to:

- Train community members about the health impacts of toxic air, particularly from wildfire smoke.
- Develop a widespread multimedia campaign to provide timely information on the hazards and risks associated with poor-air quality.
- Distribution equipment and gear to migrants and farm worker community members



Seattle Children's Injury Prevention Assessment

In 2025, we successfully completed a statewide injury prevention needs assessment in partnership with Seattle Children's Research Center. Our needs assessment was grounded in Community-Based Participatory Research (CBPR) principles and guided by the Health Belief Model. This project centered Community Health Workers (CHWs) as partners in learning and leadership, ensuring that findings were both data-driven and community-informed.

Phase I: Survey Development and Implementation

During the first phase of the project, we collaborated with CHWs to co-design and administer a comprehensive survey to **40 CHWs** across Washington State. The survey assessed knowledge of preventive trauma measures for infants, children, and adolescents, as well as perceived benefits, barriers, and confidence in educating parents and caregivers. Feedback was then analyzed using descriptive statistics and visual summaries, creating accessible tools to support shared learning and discussion.

Phase II: Collaborative Analysis and Prioritization

In the second phase, survey results were reviewed and analyzed in partnership with CHWs through 2 bilingual focus groups. These focus groups were held virtually to ensure statewide participation. Each two-hour session included a presentation of survey findings, education on age-appropriate injury prevention strategies, and in-depth discussions on future education campaigns for migrant parents and caregivers. In total, approximately 20 CHWs engaged in these collaborative sessions. Insights from the focus groups were analyzed using directed content analysis, allowing the project team and CHWs to deepen understanding of the data within the Health Belief Model framework.

Impact & Outcomes

Activities were completed successfully by combining quantitative data with rich community dialogue. In the end, this project produced clear priorities to guide future injury prevention education efforts. Most importantly, it strengthened CHW capacity, elevated community voices, and laid a strong foundation for developing culturally responsive educational interventions that promote safety and injury prevention for children and families across Washington



Caminando Juntos is a culturally responsive program designed to support Latin families who often face limited access to information, resources, and care related to postpartum mental health. Since its inception, the program has reached more than 180 families, providing education, emotional support, and trusted guidance to help families recognize, understand, and address postpartum depression.

In the past year alone, Caminando Juntos supported 60 families across Yakima County, Snohomish County, and King County, helping reduce stigma, increase awareness, and connect families to appropriate mental health and community resources. Through a compassionate, community-based approach, the program empowers parents, strengthens family well-being, and creates safer spaces for open conversations about maternal mental health within the Latin community.


Overcoming Mental Health




Public Health Careers



Young individuals are often the ones who most vividly reflect enthusiasm and excitement for their future, actively creating initiatives to work diligently toward their dreams.



Roots of Justice Youth Advocacy Program



Washington Care Fund



Why Revenue Looks Higher Than Expenses

CHWCMR received several large multi-year grants in FY2025, and accounting rules require us to record the full grant amounts as revenue in the year they are awarded. Although this revenue appears in FY2025, the funds will be received and spent gradually in future years according to each grant agreement. These awards are also restricted grants, meaning the funding can only be used for specific programs and activities defined by the funder during a set grant period. This means the revenue shown for FY2025 includes funds that were not available to use for programs or operations during the year.
